

I Can Spell My Name

Objective: Students will be able to recognize and spell their names using crayon cutouts.

Assessment:

Students will complete a name spelling worksheet where they will cut out crayon-shaped letters and arrange them to spell their names. The teacher will assess their ability to recognize and correctly arrange the letters of their names.

Key Points:

- **Name Recognition:** Understanding that a name is a unique identifier for each student.
